New Zealand signs defence agreement with China

Minister of Defence Ron Mark has signed a Memorandum of Arrangement Concerning Defence Cooperation with China's Minister of National Defence, General Wei Fenghe in Beijing.

The Ministers signed the arrangement following their bilateral meeting, in which they reviewed the state of the defence relationship.

"China and New Zealand cooperate across a range of areas. This arrangement provides a strong framework under which we can continue this cooperation. It recognises our ongoing intention to maintain dialogue across a range of levels in the defence relationship, to build our understanding of each other and promote positive links between our people" said Ron Mark.

The Arrangement recognises some specific areas of common interest, including humanitarian assistance and disaster relief, as well as international peace cooperation activities.

"From my discussions and the signing of this arrangement, it is clear to me that our two defence establishments can achieve a lot together", commented Minister Mark. "We already share commitments to United Nations peacekeeping missions, most notably in South Sudan. Our militaries are also conducting joint planning activities to ensure we work together effectively on disaster relief."

"With the increasing impacts of climate change being felt in our region and globally, most notably through damaging weather events, these strong relationships will be key in ensuring any combined support we provide is effective".

Ushavov Medal



Eighty-seven New Zealanders have been awarded the Ushakov Medal by the Russian Government. The medal is awarded for bravery. RCCNZ is requesting anyone holding this medal to contact the Club with their name and medal number — it's a four digit number most likely 17** or 18** - engraved on the medal obverse or in the small booklet that came with the medal. The information is requested on behalf of the North Russian Convoy Museum Project in Aultbea, on the shores of Loch Ewe in Wester Ross, Scotland, which would like to keep an

historical record of servicemen (RN, RNZN, Merchant Navy etc.) who were awarded this medal. Contact details are at foot of this newsletter.

RNZN appoints first female Combat Specialist

PO Samantha Carter of Taupo has become the first female Petty Officer Seaman Combat Specialist in the history of the Royal New Zealand Navy (RNZN).

PO Carter was 17 when she joined in 2008. "My mum did all the research, printed out the forms, and got me over for a coffee," she said. "She knew there was something more for me. Without her, I wouldn't have ended up anywhere."



Seaman Combat Specialists are the "gunners" of the Navy, required to handle small arms, carry out seamanship evolutions and ceremonial duties for their trade and the RNZN.

The role appealed to Petty Officer Seaman Combat Specialist Carter. "It's about serving your country in a warfighting context. It's about seamanship, being at sea, handling weapons, driving boats."

After graduating from Basic Common Training, Petty Officer Seaman Combat Specialist Carter completed her trade training and has posted since to RNZN ships HMNZS Te Kaha, Te Mana, Otago and Hawea. She has been posted overseas on Royal Australian Navy frigate HMAS Melbourne, on counter narcotic and anti-piracy patrols in the Gulf of Aden.

"I was part of the boat crews for boardings," she said. "A highlight of the trip was when the boarding party detained nine Somalian pirates. We then transported them back to the coast - that was an awesome experience."

She is currently the Petty Officer Seaman Combat Specialist on frigate HMNZS Te Kaha, and will rejoin the ship in Canada next year after its refurbishment is complete.
