Armistice Day commemorated in Wellington



An Act of Remembrance to mark Armistice Day 2023 was held at Pukeahu National War Memorial Park on Saturday 11 November at 11am. The wreath laying ceremony took place at the Tomb of the Unknown Warrior.

"We remember the sacrifice of those who lost their lives in the First World War," said Governor-General Dame Cindy Kiro.

Laulu Mac Leauanae, Secretary for Culture and Heritage said, "Each year on 11 November we come together at Pukeahu National War Memorial Park to commemorate the signing of the Armistice in 1918".

"11 November is an opportunity to reflect and honour those who have died in all conflicts, not only those during the First World War".

Veterans' Affairs Minister Meka Whaitiri said in her commemorative address "We are reminded that peace is a fragile thing, when conflict, discrimination and the terrors of war dominate daily for many around the globe."

An estimated 16,000 New Zealand soldiers were killed and 40,000 more injured during combat in Europe during the four-year war – a higher casualty rate per capita than any other country involved.

Whaitiri, National MP Tim van de Molen, Chief of Defence Air Marshal Kevin Short, Dean of the Diplomatic Corps Ahmad Salem Alwehaib, RSA national president Sir Wayne Shelford, and VC winner Willie Apiata laid wreaths at the Tomb of the Unknown Warrior.

Whaitiri also said in her speech that although the number of veterans of all wars grow fewer with time, their mana "endures and passes through the generations."

Armistice Day was also commemorated in Christchurch. The Memorial Gates of Lancaster Park were rededicated after having been damaged in the 2011 earthquakes.


Book discusses Bletchley Park's role in the Arctic Convoys

An incisive account of the Arctic convoys, and the essential role Bletchley Park and Special Intelligence played in Allied success, has recently been published.

Between 1941 and 1945, more than eight hundred shiploads of supplies were delivered to the Soviet Union protected by allied naval forces.

Each journey was a battle against the elements, with turbulent seas, extreme cold, and the constant dread of torpedoes.

These Arctic convoys have been said to be as defenceless vessels at the mercy of deadly U-boats - but was this really the case?



David Kenyon explores the story of the war in the Arctic, revealing that the contest was more evenly balanced that previously thought.

Battles included major ship engagements, aircraft carriers, and combat between surface ships. Amid this wide range of forces, Bletchley Park's Naval Section played a decisive role in Arctic operations, with both sides relying heavily on Signals Intelligence to intercept and break each other's codes.

Kenyon presents a vivid picture of the Arctic theatre of war, unearthing the full-scale campaign for naval supremacy in northern waters.

David Kenyon is a research historian at Bletchley Park. He has worked on numerous historical television and film projects, including acting as historical advisor to *Warhorse* in 2010. His books include *Bletchley Park and D-Day* and *Horsemen in No Man's Land*.

Arctic Convoy Vodka



The Royal Naval Association (RNA) in the UK has created *Arctic Convoy Vodka*, adding to the already available "1921 Reserve" Navy Strength Gin.

Arctic Convoy Vodka is a small batch Vodka (40% proof) made in conjunction with the Handmade Gin Company for the Royal Naval Reserve Officers' Club, Liverpool (the Sea Urchins) to commemorate the sailing of the first convoy from Liverpool to Archangelsk in August 1941. (Operation Dervish).

It sells in the UK for £33 and the RNA receives 10% for each bottle sold, so apart from drinking a smooth Vodka there's a little help for the Association!
