
A reminder that our newsletter is always put on our website for anyone to read.

#### **Escape in the Far East**



I've just finished reading an excellent book titled "Escape from the Japanese". Written by Lt Cdr Ralph Burton Goodwin OBE, RNZNVR the book tells of his escape from a POW camp in Hong Kong, after being incarcerated for two years, walking by night and hiding up during the day and finally

meeting up with Chinese guerrillas and the British Army Aid Group who cared for him. He was in bad physical condition but finally by way of China, Ceylon and India he made it back to New Zealand. An enthralling story, the book is available from Amazon.

On 24 April this year, a group of Kiwis living in Hong Kong will be re-enacting the first four days of Goodwin's escape route across the Kowloon hills. If you know of anyone visiting Hong Kong at that time they're welcome to join the trek (it's a quite a hike and will take around five hours — not suitable for persons with special needs). Your committee was worried recently that several articles which were donated to the Levin RSA may have gone astray after its closure. These included the model of HMS Duke of York, made by our late member Bill Leitch, plus his medals and a tankard which was engraved with the journey of the NZEF from Egypt through to North Italy. ### **HMS Foudroyant**

And now a small item of interest courtesy of a RNA branch in the UK.

A recent posted comment regarding ship's nicknames mentioned the name "Fire Hydrant" in connection with a vessel moored between Dolphin and Vernon. Those on their way ashore and return from Dolphin passed very close to it on the trip. It was always known as "Fire Hydrant" by Jack but it was HMS Foudroyant of Nelson's days and I believe a French "prize" from one of "The Little Admirals" many



victories. The legend was that Nelson's daughter Horatia was conceived on the ship. The various web sites on this vessel reveal fascinating part of RN history that matelots many might not be aware of despite passing "the old girl" many times.

The question now: is the Foudroyant still on guard duty or has she gone the same way as much of our history, to the wreckers?

The Foudroyant played a key role in Nelson's personal and professional life in the period following victory over the French in the Battle of the Nile on 1 August 1798. Embroiled, against orders, in Naples and Palermo in the preservation of the "The Kingdom of the Two Sicilies", the wounded Nelson

began his adulterous love affair with Emma Hamilton. Their daughter Horatia was probably conceived on board the Foudroyant, on a cruise to Malta. The rebel Neapolitan naval commander, Commodore Francesco Caracciolo, was court marshalled for treason and sentenced to death in Foudroyants wardroom, and her great cabin became the venue for parties that were part of Nelson and Emma's enigmatic social life. More dignified was Foudroyant's role in the capture of the only two French battleships to escape the Battle of the Nile.

Foudroyant is very much alive and well, but residing in Hartlepool (whether that's a good idea given the ship's French origins is another question!) under her first RN name of Trincomalee.

She's being restored by the same organisation that brought Warrior 1860 back from the dead in the late 80's prior to bringing her down to Pompey.

#### **Service papers**
